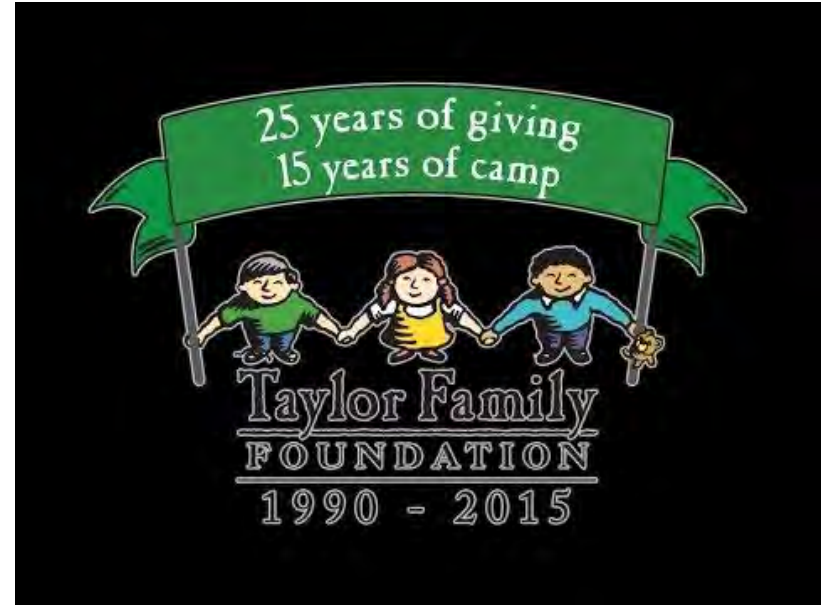
Activity Responsibilities
